CYCP Progress Update

Setting Expectations

- For many nonprofits and City agencies, asking for data is asking a lot
- Updates provided in this presentation are merely a snapshot of the work being done
- Much of the workforce is still focusing their efforts on recovering from the pandemic
- 30 Action Plans (44 Strategies, 175+ Actions) in CYCP and 1 CYCP Coordinator
- Of the 175+ actions, ~30% are in progress (gaps in knowledge of progress, not in actual progress)





Goal 1: All Children, Youth, and Families will be Physically Safe and Healthy



Known Progress Updates:

Early Education and Care

 Developing a data system with key partners to capture how children are being served by and benefiting from the early care and education system

Healthy Eating

- Implementing a menu of nutrient-dense produce like microgreens, mushrooms, and pea shoots from local growers at ACPS schools
- Most every school in the district has their own garden
- Providing universal free meals and delivery of meals to virtual learners
- ACPS School Nutrition Services was recently awarded a \$120,000 grant that will facilitate serving more kids more efficiently

Physical Health

 Planning to improve and expand access to play spaces throughout Alexandria this year

Health Care

- Alexandria's public library system offers free COVID-19 rapid at-home test kits, helping to increase access to COVID-19 testing to underresourced communities.
- A Public Health Nurse position was created to begin the development of an interdisciplinary team at the Minnie Howard Campus satellite of Teen Wellness Center



Goal 1: All Children, Youth, and Families will be Physically Safe and Healthy



Known Progress Updates Continued:

- Mental Health
 - 75 people trained in Youth Mental Health First
 Aid
 - DCHS Behavioral Health Services added four schoolbased mental health professionals, based in every high school campus, middle school and k-8 school. The team is also working to increase access to Family Mental Health Services in schools
 - 100% of schools have RULER teams who have been trained in the RULER curriculum. Additional social emotional learning programs have also been provided to schools to support social-emotional and behavioral interventions.
 - Social, emotional, and academic learning materials
 (SEAL) include the use of structures such as community
 circles and lessons on resolving conflict and emotional
 regulation.
 - Discussions and strategies for **mental health breaks** are provided as part of the SEAL curriculum.

- Prevention of Substance Use, Unintended Teen Pregnancy, and Dating/Sexual Violence
 - 2,044 pounds of unused or expired medication have been collected
 - Expanding the gun and pill lock distribution program
 - 60 youth attended the Annual
 Alexandria Youth Leadership Conference
 - 3 more peer advocates (8 total) were hired and trained in sexual and domestic violence prevention, substance abuse prevention, sexual health education, and general advocacy and presentation skills
 - 85-112 middle schoolers have received
 12 workshops about healthy relationships
 and prevention from the Peer Advocates



Goal 1: All Children, Youth, and Families will be Physically Safe and Healthy



Known Progress Updates Continued:

Housing

- Through ARPA funding:
 - \$200,000 was invested into an eviction protection program
 - \$312,000 was invested into rental resiliency with the end goal of maintaining long-term housing stability and security

Transportation

 Service on all **DASH routes are free** of charge for all riders

Immigrant Resources

 Held a resource roundtable discussion among community partners to improve resource sharing among local agencies serving immigrant populations

Basic Needs

- Through ARPA funding, investments were made into:
 - developing a digital equity plan that will **identify infrastructure**, **device**, **and digital literacy barriers** in Alexandria.
 - Alexandria Library Mobile Hotspot Lending Program
 - addressing food insecurity by creating food centers continuing food distribution
 - Preventing food insecurity and eviction
 - supporting the creation of new businesses and jobs
 - Supporting residents seeking jobs
 - connecting residents to local, state and federal services and offer emergency financial resources to low-income residents who aren't eligible for government-sponsored programs
 - supporting a Guaranteed Income Pilot that will impact 150 households



Goal 2: All Children will be Academically Successful and Career Ready

Known Progress Updates:

- Educational Equity
 - All students in Alexandria get a library card
 - Alexandria City Council allocated ARPA funding for out-of-school time enrichment and financial assistance to assist with learning loss and increase academic and social supports to children, in addition to traditional recreational activities.



Classroom Technology

 Residents can check out a hot spot, a device that allows you to connect to the internet for free, from Alexandria Libraries

College & Career Success

- Expanding the College and Career Center at the Alexandria City High School so there can be a stronger focus on the graduation rate for Hispanic males
- The Workforce Development Center is equipping youth for success through training, employment, entrepreneurship and leadership opportunities
- 89 students were recruited to join Project Discovery which prepares low income and first-generation college-eligible students to access opportunities in higher education
- 55 parents attended the Real Cost of College: How to Pay for It Workshop in January 2022

Goal 3: All Children, Youth, and Families will have Positive Experiences

Known Progress Updates:

- Safe Schools
 - Safe Routes to School encouraged ACPS families and staff to participate in National Walk to School Day 2021



Resilient Communities

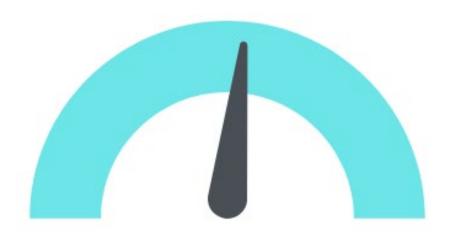
- 141 community members attended Alexandria's
 Trauma and Resiliency Summit
- 28 ACE Interface Presenters in Alexandria; 11+ Presentations Delivered
- Awarded \$350 to create mini-grants for organizations wanting to transform their spaces into TI environments
- Engaged 460+ community members in workshops on Understanding ACEs, Creating Trauma-Informed Spaces, Trauma-Informed Supervision, Cultivating Authentic Community Engagement and Advocacy 101
- Annually promote daily activities during Resilience
 Week VA and Racial Truth and Reconciliation Week

Goal 3: All Children, Youth, and Families will have Positive Experiences

Known Progress Updates:

- Asset Building
 - 100 people trained in Developmental Assets
 - 60 people trained in "Intentional Relationships" focused on building positive developmental relationships with young people
- Youth Empowerment
 - Fully implemented a 7-week Civics Academy for Youth
 - Created a youth seat on the Community Services Board
 - Engaged over 40 people in a youth-led forum, "Alexandria Youth Speak Up"
- Caring Adults
 - 135 mentors and mentor program staff were trained in Developmental Assets
 - Created and filled a new position, AMP Coordinator, to support the alignment of high-quality mentoring programs and ongoing mentor development and retention within the AMP
 - Raised awareness among City staff of the policy that incentivizes employees to dedicate work time towards mentoring one hour a week
 - Recruited three or more programs to join the Alexandria Mentoring Partnership

- Social Connectedness
 - Hosted Titan Teen Takeover Nights and Community Cookouts at various sites in the community
- Out of School Time Programs
 - Dozens of afterschool providers from across the city received trainings on the science of Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) and trauma-informed care.
 - The Youth Support Network was established to focus on building relationships and collaboration among out-ofschool time stakeholders





Coordinated and Equitable Systems

Known Progress Updates:

Racial Equity

- Provided community members the opportunity to develop and use their skills in advocacy
- CYFCC co-sponsored Alexandria Youth Speak Up event
- Participated in building a statewide Unified Policy Agenda that advances trauma-informed and racial equity policies
- Create a Civics Academy for Youth, modeled after the City Academy, where youth commissioners can be recruited from
- Investing in and requiring city staff to attend equity trainings and continuous learning

Organizational Capacity

- Implementing workplace wellness initiatives
- Developed and using a common system of measurement to track our progress and measure our performance
- Enhanced Communications and awareness with the creation of the CYCP Report Card
