 SUBJECT: PARK AND RECREATION COMMISSION DIVISION UPDATE ITEM

OSTP School Year Update and/or Summer Status:

We are currently offering out-of-school time programming (OSTP) at (12) afterschool locations which include (3) LINK Club locations, (2) ESSER locations, and (2) specialty programs (Youth Achieving Greatness and TR Achieving Greatness). The LINK Club programs are a partnership with ACPS funded through 21st Century Learning Grants and ACPS Covid Recovery funds (ESSER).

Current Summer Enrollment for Power-On: 767, many locations still have space.

We are currently offering the OSTP Summer Power-On/ Power-Up program at (14) locations which include (2) specialty programs Camp Adventure and TR Camp Adventure.

Partnerships & Collaborations: ACPS, Americans Rescue Plan Act (ARPA), Virginia Cooperative Extension (4-H), Upcycle, Momentum Collective Inc., and Buddie Ford Nature Center. These partners and organizations are providing specialized programming, academic support, or enrichment activities at Elementary and Middle School OSTP, LINK Club and ESSER sites.

The OSTP Committee is currently working to revise the OSTP Standard Operating Procedures and OSTP Staff Manual, in addition to revising the OSTP Site Monitoring Observation Form to align our program with program quality standards that are conducive to the service we provide.

Program Wrap-ups:

- During February, Nannie J. Lee celebrated "LOVE", the love for black history, the love for Valentine's Day, and the love of all things "Red". The participants in the Youth Achieving Greatness and Therapeutic Achieving Greatness Program enjoyed the activities, games, and crafts circling the awesome observances in February. On Valentine's Day, there was a "love table" with goodies and sweets for families. This was the staff's way of showing love and appreciation for allowing us to service a great afterschool program for their children.
- On February 16, Patrick Henry Recreation Center hosted **Teen All-Star Night**. The event showcased the athletic prowess of local teens through a series of engaging competitions. The night included a 3-Point Contest, Dunk Contest, and a 3 vs 3 tournament. Beyond the competitions, the event emphasized the values of community and sportsmanship, fostering connections among the local youth. The Teen All-Star Night proved to be a resounding success, creating lasting memories and strengthening community bonds.





 On February 20, Mt. Vernon Recreation Center held its Black History Month event. Youth participated in Black Social Dance: From Jazz to Hip Hop and Beyond! They learned fun and iconic moves from Black American social dance forms to connect the past to the present and the impact black dance and dancers have had on American culture over multiple decades.



• On February 23, Leonard Chick Armstrong Recreation Center hosted **Movie Night.** The event attracted several moviegoers of all ages to watch an old classic.... TROLLS. All participants had the opportunity to get cozy and comfortable by bringing their pillows, blankets, and chairs for a great movie night adventure.

• On February 24, the Patrick Henry Recreation Center **Circle of Girls Teen Group** attended a field trip to the Huffman AMC Theater to see **"Bob Marlie"** for Black History Month. 16 teens attended the trip.







 On February 29, Patrick Henry Recreation Center hosted their annual Black History Month program. Youth participants have been practicing diligently and were excited to showcase their hard work. Patrick Henry's OSTP participants put on various performances for their



parents themed around black history for the center's Black History Month program. Children and parents alike enjoyed the evening's performances with each group giving their all-in support and remembrance of African American history.




• On March 1, Mt. Vernon Recreation Center celebrated **Read Across America**. It is a nationwide reading celebration created by the National Education Association (NEA) in 1997 to promote literacy and encourage a love of reading among children. We had readers come in and read with the children and do special activities with them. Special thanks to staff from the "Buddie" Ford Nature Center and Alexandria Fire Dept. for participating. - On March 5, Jerome "Buddie" Ford Nature Center hosted a Survival Skills Day Camp. Participants learned how to find and treat freshwater, what plants and fungi not to eat, and the materials needed to build fires and shelters.
- On March 8, through a new partnership with the Boys and Girls Club of Greater Washington, the Durant Center hosted a **Teen Glow Party**. Over 100 teens participated.
- On March 8, Jerome "Buddie" Ford Nature Center participated in Douglas MacArthur Elementary School's **career day**. Approximately 300 students experienced a day in the life of an environmental educator as well as an animal caretaker.

• On March 9, the **Winter Basketball League** ended its season with the championship games played at Alexandria City High School. 1076 participants played in the league in boys' and girls' divisions (108 teams total). This season, the Sports Section adjusted the age from 17 to 18. By adjusting the age, 25 additional boys and girls were able to participate in the 18U division instead of aging out of the league.

Program Updates:

• During February, Patrick Henry Recreation Center's **Hip Hop Fitness & Circuit Training** class has continued to increase in popularity. Currently, at maximum capacity with 10 participants, this class is a cardiovascular fat-burning workout for adults. It aids in firming and sculpting your body through hip-hop dance and timed interval circuit training geared toward increasing endurance, burning calories, and strengthening and toning muscles and flexibility.



• On Friday mornings, Patrick Henry Recreation Center offers a **Silver Artisan Program**. The senior participants enjoy knitting, painting, watercolors, crafts, and Mandalas. The number of new participants is steadily increasing.
