Car Valuation Increase

- Car values continue to increase
 - 15% of the vehicle tax base increased 5% in 2021 (Average)
 - 87% of the vehicle tax base increased 26% in 2022 (Average)
- Unprecedented situation
- Proposed solution to provide tax relief
- Additional adjustment to increase relief to lower valued cars

- Raises 100% relief from \$1,000 to \$5,000
- Provides 100% tax relief to 32,214 vehicles
- Eliminates personal property tax for 1/3 of January vehicle tax base
- Provides higher tax relief to lowest valued cars
- All vehicle owners get tax relief

Recommendation

- Apply the PPTRA Tax Relief Proposal for this fiscal year
- Place the \$2 million into contingency reserve for Climate Change Actions
 - Staff will bring a proposal to Council in the fall for the use of the funds
 - Proposal allows for additional focus on climate change with feedback and input from the community

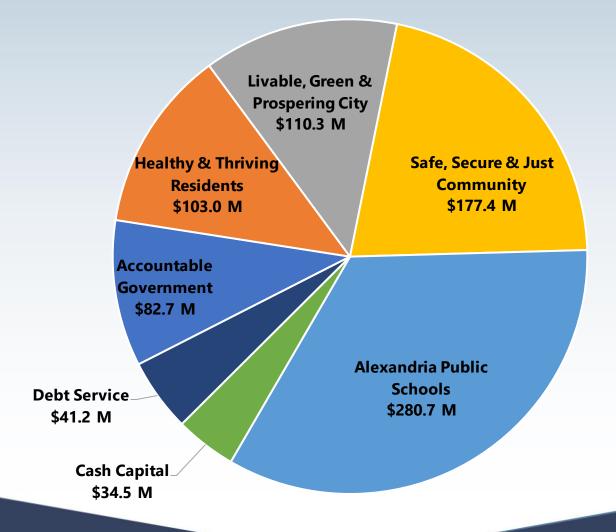
Budget Strategy

DASH



DASH FY23 Summary

- City Support increases by \$3.5m (+17.9%) to \$23m:
 - Mandated wage adjustments per the Collective Bargaining Agreement, Fare Free service, New DASH Network operating costs, fuel costs, vehicle and facility maintenance, and technology.
 - Supports additional staff in Training, Maintenance, Operations and Technology. Positions necessary to sustain the New DASH Network.
- Fare Free Service:
 - TRIP program funds \$2.8m in FY23
 - Total TRIP Funding over 4 years: \$7,236,171

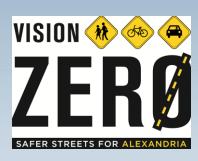
DASH Fleet Electrification

- Capital:
 - Goal: purchase only electric as of FY 2027
 - Strategy: leveraging CIP funds in FY23 to pursue "Low or No Emission Program" (and) "Bus and Bus Facilities" FTA discretionary grants
 - Outcome: if successful, 15 buses purchased in FY23 100% electric
 - Infrastructure: leveraging same grant programs for new charging infrastructure
- Goal: Entire fleet fully electric by FY 2035

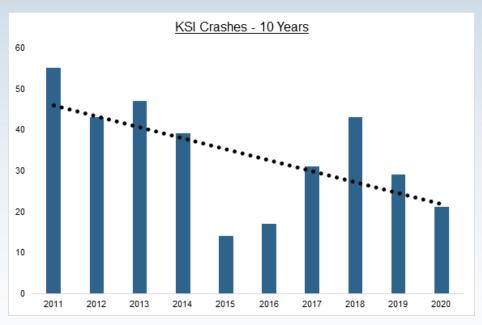


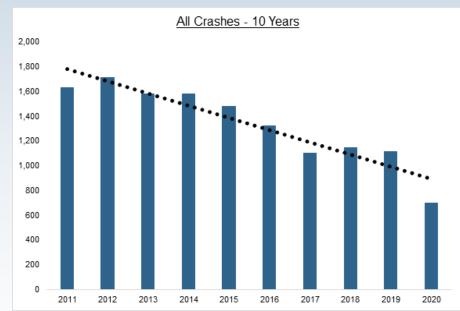

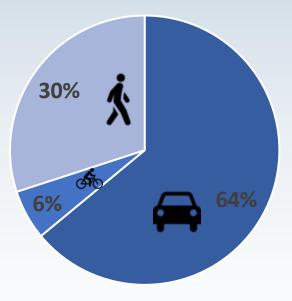

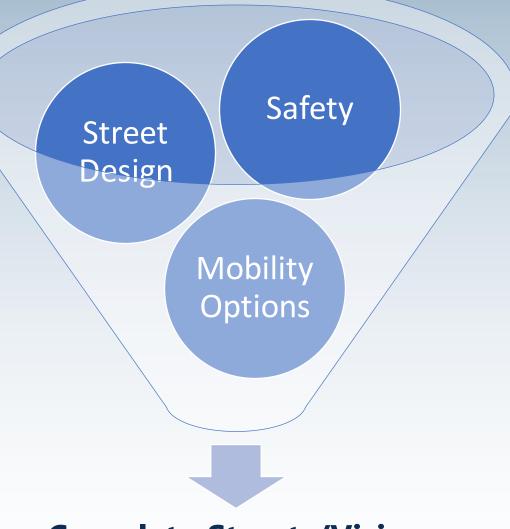
Percentage of Fatal and Severe Crashes

Total: \$51.2m in FY 23-32 CIP

- Complete Streets (\$9 m)
 - Staffing

- Lower King Street (NEW-\$2.4m)

Economic & Cultural Investments

- \$150,000 in seed funding for the creation of a Business Improvement District (BID) in Old Town
- Restored funding for destination advertising
- Funding for event management and marketing to enhance impact of the Scottish Christmas Walk Weekend
- Historic Alexandria ARPA projects:
 - Alexandria's 275th anniversary programming
 - Alexandria Community Remembrance Project documentary



Housing



Housing Analyst

Housing Analyst position will support Affordable Housing Development Team

- Affordable housing projects, including development review and financial analyses, with potential focus on P3 projects
- Citywide planning processes, and internal planning for HMP update
- Research, data collection and program/policy analyses, performance metrics documentation, GIS projects, housing publications and reports
- Monitoring set aside units (in support of asset management)

Housing ARPA-funded Projects

Tranche 2

- \$2.45 M Arlandria Chirilagua Housing Cooperative (ACHC) capital improvements
- \$10 M AHDC Arlandria infrastructure, e.g., stormwater and sewer system improvements and upgrades (also benefit neighborhood and future development), new connector road, land assemblage, site work, open space improvements

Tranche 1 (funded in FY 2022)

- \$50K ACHC capital needs assessment to identify and prioritize projects
- \$312K Rental Resiliency Temporary staff (bi-lingual) to support Housing's Landlord Tenant function through COVID recovery (provide onsite assistance at courthouse and in field to marshal resources and prevent evictions)
- \$2 M City Flex Space Arlandria-Chirilagua satellite space for city agencies (DCHS, AHD, LT) to bring services to community (design, buildout, parking, operating reserve)





Broadband Initiative





BROADBAND & FIBER PROJECTS

- 1. Broadband Franchises Citywide
- 2. \$432K for a utility engineer, two inspectors and \$90K in non-personnel expenditures
- 3. Using microtrenching to install broadband
- 4. Fast paced ~ Up to 3,000 ft/day/crew, construction moving through multiple City blocks every day
