


 Throughout Virginia, there are more than 23 communities coming together across disciplines around traumainformed care. Most of these groups form as traumainformed community networks (TICNs).

Key Elements of a TICN

Communicate & Engage	Navigate Barriers & Obstacles
 Develop a system for sharing resources and information between community members (i.e. Newsletter, emails, SharePoint page, CCF Connection, CYFCC's Facebook page, ACEs Connection) Hold regular standing meetings that are engaging (include updates from committees' work, invite guest speakers, share resources) Provide trainings (i.e. "Trauma and Healing 101", "Trauma-Informed Supervisor," "Understanding ACEs", "Trauma Awareness & ACEs," "ACE Interface," Intro to Trauma-Informed Practice in Schools," "Secondary Trauma," TICN Orientation for new members, etc.) Build public awareness about trauma and building community resilience (Host film screenings of documentaries like "Resilience" and "Paper Tigers" and discuss) 	 Set realistic and attainable goals and expectations. Identify trauma champions who will help sustain this work and support development of leadership teams within organizations, systems, and communities Develop a shared language Elicit buy in and commitment from System, Organization, and Community Leaders Formally acknowledge and challenge barriers Acknowledge and talk about the historical and systemic trauma within the community and racial, cultural, and socioeconomic issues impacting this work
Identify Strengths & Needs	Research Other Efforts

 Bring people together across disciplines to support trauma informed practices, advance trauma-informed policies Hold forums and conversations around unmet needs regarding trauma Create a network that moves people out of siloes and encourages cross-sector collaboration 	 Develop a structure for committees to carry out the work, with identified leadership for each committee Examples of Committees: Children and Youth Mental Health Committee, Training Committee, Legal and Courts Committee, Schools Committee, Healthcare Committee, Screening Tool Committee, Workforce Development Committee, Policy Committee, Outcomes Committee





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

Looking ahead to the next five years, we will....

Use Results-Based Accountability (RBA) to measure our performance

Ask three simple questions to measure our the quality and effectiveness of our performance: How much did we do? How well did we do it? Is anyone better off?

Align the CYMP 2025 with other City-wide plans

including the Community Health Improvement Plan 2025 and the Alexandria City Public Schools Strategic Plan.

Work together. Connect the dots. Develop our shared measurement. Use a common lens, like equity, trauma-informed, and the developmental assets framework to approach our shared work.

Increase Systems Change by shifting the conditions that are holding the problems in place

To understand and deal with the root causes of complex problems, examine and possibly change:

policies, practices, & resource flows,

relationships and connections, & power dynamics,

& deeply held beliefs that are taken for granted as ways of operating of we think, do, act

Decrease ACEs. Increase Assets.

Frame the CYMP 2025 around healing from trauma and preventing adverse childhood experiences, while strengthening families, promoting community resilience, empowering youth, and building positive relationships and developmental assets.
