

# ACTIVITY #2

**NAMING EXERCISE** 

Activity #2 consisted of a naming activity which allowed participants to provide their input on a new name for the museum. Prior to the activity, a member from OHA provided evidence and research on the former names of the museum along with the names on the building's sign. During the activity, participants were divided into groups, and ask to develop a new name for the building and explain why they chose that specific name. Few participants felt the name "Freedom House" should remain because it expressed a sense of Hope and Reverend Bailey's Story, others felt the name should change. In this section you will see the new suggested name changes.

#### NAMES OVER TIME - THE BUILDING SIGN

## PRICE, BIRCH & CO/DEALERS IN SLAVES

This company moves into the building in 1859 (Kephart sells them the building in 1858 but the previous tenants just don't move out?) and operates here until just prior to the Union army liberating the site on May 24, 1861. This sign is visible in a number of Civil War-era photographs and many soldiers describe this text in letters during the war. It was apparently still visible under a thin coat of paint until at least 1870, and in theory may still exist under the paint if the façade has never been stripped (the HSR was unable to find any evidence of it)

#### FRANKLIN & ARMFIELD

E.A. Andrews sees this sign over the front door when he tours the site July 24, 1835.

#### NAMING EXERCISE SUMMARY FROM SESSION 1

Freedom House: The Center of the Mid-Atlantic Domestic Slave Trade

Group 1 felt the name of the museum should not reference Franklin and Armfield, but wanted to keep the name "Freedom House" with a colon to further specify the significance of place. Participants in Group 1 did not want to keep the name "Freedom House" at first, but then kept the name because they felt history could not be denied.

#### Freedom House

The name "Freedom House" should kept as the name of the museum. Group 2 felt a plaque should be shown to explain why the name of the museum is "Freedom House" to acknowledge the legacy and educate visitors. They believe that out of this house came freedom - place matters - in Alexandria it is a monument to freedom, epitaph to slavery

#### Alexandria Slave Pen

The name "Freedom House" is not appropriate name for the museum. Group 3 felt there was nothing "pretty" about what happened here. They felt the museum should go back to its original name. They introduced an idea to have a wall within the museum to showcase all the previous names of the museum (See page 14 within the summary) to use it as a historical reference and educate visitors. People, especially younger visitors, need to know exactly what happened at the site.

#### Other Notes:

- Pen vs Jail vs Prison Pen because it puts you to inhumanity
- Slave Pen to Freedom House Urban League Reaction The Urban League should be consulted in the renaming process.
- Names in honor of Henry Bailey freed by emancipation and walked back from Texas.
- · Written into deed that name be kept for 5 years.
- · Visitor feedback people are very confused. Has to be explained.

#### NAMING EXERCISE SUMMARY FROM SESSION 2

#### **Edmonson Sisters Museum**

One participant felt the name "Freedom House at 1315 Duke Street" is not reflective of what it was, but others felt the name "Freedom House" was aspirational and pointed to the future. Collectively, Group 1 felt the address and the word "memorial" should be included in the name. A sense of "Hope" needs to be reference within the name and the mission statement.

#### The Alexandria Slave Trade Museum

The name "Freedom House" should not be kept as the name of the museum. Group 2 felt the name should be linked to the mission statement, and highlighted the word "Pen" from the word cloud which was provided during the presentation. (See page 15 within the summary)

## ACTIVITY #3

**EXHIBIT MAPPING EXERCISE**

During this activity, members from Proun present two (2) exhibit mapping options per floor of the museum. Participants were then asked to verbally provide their feedback on what was presented and their responses where recorded.

Re-connect to historic themes and provide visitors with opportunities to reflect and respond.


