



# The History of Age Friendly Communities

# AARP's Adoption of Age Friendly Communities

Recognizing the demographic shifts underway, and the opportunity they present to create more age-friendly communities, in 2012 AARP created a US-based affiliate of WHO's Global Network of Age-friendly Cities and Communities (GNAFCC). The GNAFCC invites cities around the world to use a foundation of eight "domains" to assess community needs and then develop a course of action over a five-year process to create a more age-friendly future for their communities.

- November 2017 AARP Virginia and Just Partners with the Commission on Aging hosted oneday workshop
- 2019 City Council approved unanimously the current Age Friendly Plan (See Photo on lower right)
- 2024 City Council approves AFP <u>Final Report</u>



#### Highlights of Current AFP

- Senior Services of Alexandria recruited over 120 Community Ambassadors
- COA participated in recommendations for developer affordable housing contribution policy
- COA completed 13 walkability audits with AARP
- Advocated in City Council for full-time WDC 55+ coordinator; free DASH rides; increase in Rent Relief for older adults; by-right ordinance for ADUs; expansion of Real Estate Tax Relief program
- Secured additional funding for outreach to underserved communities and for DAAS programs
- <u>Expanded outreach on LGBTQ+</u> issues
- Developed concept of Mixed Income Affordable Assisted Living Facility (MIAALF)

#### Process for Revised AFP

- January 17, 2025 Kick Off at Lee Center
- February- April Group meetings at Ladrey, Claridge Towers, and Charles Houston Community Center
- February <u>Age Friendly Community Survey launched</u>
- July 2 Town Hall meeting on AFP and Area Agency on Aging Plan under the Older Americans Act
- Revised Plan Fall 2025
- Fall 2025 City Council Approval
- Fall 2025, Early 2026 AARP Submission

### Proposed Housing Goals - Goal 1

- Goal 1: Advocate for mixed income affordable assisted living facility (MIAALF) as approved in the COA Concept Plan for such a facility.
- Objective 1.1: Build support for mixed income affordable assisted living facility.
- Objective 1.2: Advocate for amending Section 7-700 to address the unique aspects of independent and assisted living developments

#### MIAALF - Part of Master Housing Plan

- According to <u>Housing Needs Analysis</u> projections through 2040, the age cohort anticipated to continue to experience the highest rate of growth in the City of Alexandria, Virginia are adults aged 65+.
- Since 2006, a significant percentage of Virginia case managers reported problems finding available assisted living for auxiliary grant recipients. <u>JLARC Low Income</u> <u>Assisted Living Residents 2012</u>
  - While the auxiliary grant program supports assisted living care, the 2025 payment (\$2,103 monthly statewide, \$2,418 monthly in Northern Virginia) is far below the actual cost of care.

### Proposed Housing Goals - Goal II

Goal II: Enhance Housing affordability for older Alexandrians

- Objective 2.1: Advocate for Increased Funding for City Rent Relief Fund for Older Adults
- Objective 2.2: Promote Eviction Protections
- Objective 2.3: Promote the use of Accessory Dwelling Units

## Proposed Housing Goals - Goal III

- Goal III: Prevent the unnecessary or unwanted institutionalization of older adults who could and would prefer to remain in their homes or in the community for as long as possible.
- Objective 3.1: Increase Alexandrians' awareness and access to programs and services supportive of older adults and adults with disabilities as well as their caregivers.
- Objective 3.2: Advocate for financially viable budget proposals that would increase and expand funding for affordable programs providing personal assistance with activities of daily living.
- Objective 3.3: Sponsor/conduct public education programs, in collaboration with the Outreach Committee and community partners, on home modifications and home sharing.

## Other Proposed Age Friendly Goals

- Support and expand support for Workforce Center 50+ programs.
- Increase Access to Food Services
- Advocate for additional resources to fill any gaps created by potential cuts in the federal low-income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) and Virginia Energy Assistance (EAP)
- Preserve Medicaid Eligibility for Older Adults
- Promote Mental Wellness and Dementia-Friendly Supports
- Those who walk, drive, and ride a bicycle in Alexandria can do so safely.
