





The History of Age Friendly Communities

AARP's Adoption of Age Friendly Communities

- Recognizing the demographic shifts underway, and the opportunity they present to create more age-friendly communities,
- In 2012 AARP created a US-based affiliate of WHO's Global Network of Age-friendly Cities and Communities (GNAFCC).
- GNAFCC invites cities to use a foundation of eight "domains"
 - Assess community needs
 - Develop a course of action over a five-year process
 - Create a more age-friendly future for their communities



Proposed Transportation Goals – 2026-2028

- Goal 1: Assist the City to Attain its Vision Zero goal of Eliminating all Traffic Deaths and Serious Injuries by 2028 through the Attainment of Interim Year Benchmarks
- Objective 1.1: Apply the Complete Design Guidelines to roadway projects through
 FY28 in locations where safety issues for vulnerable populations have been identified
- Objective 1.2: Develop strategies for **traffic calming** through the combination of mainly physical measures that reduce the negative effects of motor vehicle use, alter driver behavior and improve conditions for non-motorized street users.


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
Discussion Item: Curbside Electric Vehicle Charging Update



Background




Roadmap for how to encourage EV adoption and meet the current and future community EV charging needs.



By 2030: 50% of car sales are electric

By 2050: 100% of car sales are electric



Reduce GHG emissions to at least 1-3 mtCO2 per capita by FY2040; actions specify planning and implementation of public charging.



Chargers vs. Charging Ports

- A charger is the physical
- equipment
 - A charger can have several ports
- for charging more than one vehicle
 - Charging ports = parking spaces





Key Features

- Publicly accessible chargers
- Deployed at no cost to the City or property owners
- 5-year license per charger
- Minimalistic design
- EV Charging Only parking

Siting Restrictions

- King Street
- Duke Street, west of Route 1
- Washington Street (George Washington Memorial Parkway
- Patrick Street
- Henry Street, south of Roundhouse Lane
- Richmond Highway



Siting Restrictions

- Up to 2 chargers per block by vendor
- Cannot be located within 0.25 mi of other public chargers
- Maximum of 20 charging ports per vendor, with a maximum of 60 charging ports installed

Action Item: CMAQ/RSTP Grant Application





Federal & State Funding

Congestion Mitigation & Air Quality (CMAQ)

- Projects that reduce emissions and improve air quality
- Operating Costs for Initial 3 Years of New/Expanded Service
- Transportation Demand Management

Regional Surface Transportation Program (RSTP)


- Improve or preserve transportation infrastructure
- Research & Studies
- Bike/Ped Improvements, Trails, ADA, Transit, Smart Mobility

FY 2032 Funding Application for 3 projects (~\$5.2 million)



Duke Street/Rte 1 Safety Improvements (Up to \$3.2M)

- Recommendations from Regional Road Safety grant (MWCOG)
- Duke and Patrick/Henry
 - High Crash Corridors
- Extensive public engagement





Capital Bikeshare (Up to \$1M)



- State of Good Repair
- Replacing older stations
 - Up to 24
- Ensures reliability



Safe Streets Studies (Up to \$1.0M)

- Flexible to accommodate future needs
- Examples:
 - Vision Zero Action Plan Updates
 - Safe Routes to School Walk Audits
 - Corridor and intersection studies

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Action Item: DRPT State Assistance





Operating Assistance (up to \$42.5M)

- State reimbursement for general operating expenses for DASH & Paratransit
 - Typically, 20-30% reimbursement
 - Avg: \$6.8M Annually

Capital Assistance (up to \$16M)

- Bus Replacement
- Typically, 60-68% reimbursement





Workforce Development (up to \$110K)

- 2 Interns/apprentices
- 20% local match required

MERIT Minor Enhancement Program (Up to \$500,000)

- Improving bus stops with shelters, benches, ADA improvements, etc.
- 32% local match required






TRIP (up to \$1,025,000)

- Free WMATA Student fares
- \$527,500 local match required
 FY27-FY31

Commuter Assistance Program (CAP) - up to \$350K

- GO Alex staffing and programming
- 20% local match required
