CYCP Priority Areas



- **Cost of Living / Affordability:**

- The financial pressures that affect youth and families' ability to live, learn, and thrive in Alexandria, including housing costs, food insecurity, transportation barriers, and the stress these challenges create.



- **School Conditions & Student Well-being:**

- The day-to-day physical and operational environment of schools, such as facilities, maintenance, lunch schedules, bathrooms, transportation, and class transitions, and how these factors impact learning, wellness, and belonging.



- **Safety & Violence Prevention:**

- Physical and psychological safety across schools and communities, including bullying, fights, emotional harm, discrimination, online conflict, and exposure to community violence, plus the root causes and supports needed to create safe, connected environments.

- Reflect on student recommendations
- Begin identifying policy and strategy directions
- Prepare for the Commission's role in the next CYCP

- Based on what youth told us during the 2024-2025 Listening Sessions.
- Designed to help our community take action on youth priorities.

WHERE THE INFORMATION COMES FROM

- 94 Youth Listening Sessions
- 1,140+ middle & high school students
- Local data showing how youth experiences fit larger trends

WHO PARTICIPATED

- 5 schools (4 Public, 1 Private)
- 22% LGBTQ+ youth
- 816 BIPOC youth
- 277 White youth
- 40 Middle Eastern or Northern African youth

- What Youth Want vs. What They Experience Now.
- Direct Quotes from youth.

WHY IT MATTERS

- Youth are experts in their own experiences.
- Listening builds trust and leads to better programs and policies.
- Acting on this feedback can help all youth thrive.

HOW TO USE THESE BRIEFS

- Shape programs, policies, and funding to reflect youth priorities.
- Share with colleagues, partners, and decision-makers.
- Start conversations with youth about solutions that work for them.
