



Notes: Sector 3 had only a slight increase (1.7%) in Part II Crimes in 2017. Of note are the large increases in Drunkenness (59.5%), Liquor Law Violations (57.4%) and Weapon Violations (96.8%). Although the percent change for Prostitution appears large, it is influenced by the small values (6 to 15). Prostitution counts are also greatly influenced by proactive police work.



COMMUNITY POLICING / ENGAGEMENT

Neighborhood Crime Information

- In 2017, there were 139 Calls For Service (CFS) in the **James Bland** Neighborhood that resulted in a reportable incident (471 total CFS). The Top 3 CFS were for Larceny (18), Domestic Violence (16), and Disorderly Conduct (9). The most active CFS areas for reportable incidents were the 800 Block of N Patrick (12.2% of total reportable), the 1000 Block of Montgomery St (10.8%), the 900 Block of N Henry St (9.35%) and the 800 Block of N Alfred St (7.2%).
- In the **Hopkins-Tancil** Neighborhood, there were a total of 88 CFS; however, only 16 of them resulted in a reportable incident. Of the reportable CFS, 31.3% of them were for Domestic Violence.
- Of the 972 Calls For Service associated with the **Inner City** Area in 2017, just 172 resulted in a reportable incident. The Top 3 situations were for an Accident w/ Property Damage (17), a Hit & Run Accident w/ Property Damage (17), and Larceny (13). The top locations were the 500 Block of N Payne St, the 600 Block of N Payne St, and the 1000 Block of Queen St, all with eight (8) reportable incidents.
- In the **Arlandria** Neighborhood, there were a total of 1602 CFS in 2017; of those, 440 resulted in a reportable incident. The Top 3 reported incident were for Domestic Violence (55), Runaway Juvenile (29) and Disorderly Conduct (28). The most active street segments were the 600 Block of Four Mile Rd (11.8% of the 440), 3800 Block of Executive Av (9.6%), and 500 Block of Four Mile Rd (9.3%).
- In 2017, there were 139 Calls For Service to the **Andrew Adkins** Neighborhood. Of those calls, 50 resulted in a report being taken by an officer. Most often, the incidents were for Domestic Violence (7), Larceny (3), Police Information (3) and Trespassing (3).
- There were 85 total Calls For Service in the **Chatham Square** Area in 2017, of which, 21.2% were associated with an alarm - 18 CFS. Of those 85 CFS, 15 ended with a report being taken by an officer; 20% were for Larceny (3).

SUBJECT: QUALITY OF LIFE STATISTICS FOR NOVEMBER & DECEMBER 2017

During the months of November and December the Inmate Work Detail participants performed community service projects. The crew also provided assistance to other city agencies and responded to specific requests. Those projects are included in this report as well. Normally, there are two work detail crews with up to four or five participants per crew. The number of participants fluctuate throughout the months due to limited qualified participants. During this reporting period, there was an average of 4 inmates participating on the program.

LITTER PATROL:

- Public Safety Center

SPECIAL PROJECTS AND REQUEST:

- Cleaned ACJS bathrooms and office areas.
- Stocked paper products for ACJS staff.
- Cut trees at Gate C at the PSC.
- Mopped, buffed, and waxed floors within WGTADC.
- Moved furniture from 2nd Floor Operations and the Detention Center to storage.
- Cleaned leaves from the delta's barriers at the Detention Center access gates.
- Painted office areas and security doors within the WGTADC.
- Collected 31 barricades from Lee Street (Halloween Parade).
- Distributed and collected 75 barricades on Mt. Vernon Ave (Turkey Trot).
- Distributed and collected 75 barricades on King St. (Christmas Walk).
- Distributed and collected 40 barricades on John Carlyle (Christmas Market).
- Placed Christmas wreaths and garland on the lamppost along the King Street corridor.
- Prepared tables and arranged toys for Operation Elf.

- Removed and disposed of furniture items at 110 N. Royal St.
- Moved supplies from the storage facility on Dove St. to the Durant Center for First Night.
- Unloaded 678 Christmas Trees for APD Youth Camp.
- Treated PSC grounds to include entrances, sidewalks and the parking lot during inclement weather.

During November and December the number of hours completed by the Inmate Work Detail totaled 152 hours. The total funds saved in City wages for this time period was \$13,530.00



Fatal Opioid Overdose Rates (2007-2017)





- Grant Award! – VDH HIV EIS (Epidemiologic Investigation Service)
 - Universal testing throughout the community
 - Neighborhood Health
 - Quality assurance
 - Educational outreach to Alexandria healthcare providers
 - Improve systems for linkage, and reconnection, to care



Focus Areas Summary

Trending: Inoperable vehicles, stop work orders, trash on multi-family collection areas. Early trash staging, violation notices issued have increased compared to 2016-2017.

- Presidential Greens- Increasing trash service and bulk pick up from 3 to 4 times weekly.
- Tiger Market- Manager tasked store clerks to clean parking lot daily of trash and debris.
- MOM'S Organic/ PetValu- Monitoring rear of stores for trash and clean daily.
- Lynhaven - Inoperable vehicles on private property. Door hangers before enforcement.
- Humes Springs alleys – less bulk trash, coordinating with T&ES for spring alley cleaning.
- Staff attending Hume Springs Civic Association meeting on 1/22/18.
