

The assault occurred along the 4100 block of Mount Vernon Ave. The victims were two 21 year old H/Ms, one a city resident, who were stabbed by MS-13 gang members. Three 19 year old H/M city residents and a 29 year old H/M city resident were suspects in this case. The case has been closed by arrest.
- The second gang motivated incident of the year was a felonious assault that occurred on 4/26/2015 at 0315 hours. The assault occurred along the 3900 block of Executive Avenue. The victim was a 30 year old H/M city resident, who was assaulted by several young H/Ms believed to be affiliated with MS-13. The suspects were armed with a machete. The case is currently pending.

The assault occurred along the 4100 block of Mount Vernon Ave. The victim was a 32 year old H/M city resident, who was shot by an MS-13 gang member. A 24 year old H/M city resident, a 15 year old H/M city resident, and a 16 year old H/M city resident were suspects in this case. The case has been closed by arrest.
- The fourth gang motivated incident of the year was a robbery that occurred on 7/9/2015 at 0330 hours. The robbery occurred at 3803 Executive Ave. The victim was a 20 year old H/M city resident, who was robbed of his cell phone and cash by MS-13 gang members. There were a total of six suspects in the case, two of which have been identified: a 23 year old H/M city resident and a 20 year old H/M city resident. The case has been closed by arrest.
- The fifth gang motivated incident of the year was a felonious assault that occurred on 7/25/2015 at 1920 hours. The assault occurred at 4131 Mount Vernon Ave. The victims were four H/Ms between the ages of 21 and 30 years old, all city residents, who were threatened with knives by MS-13 gang members. There were a total of seven suspects. Those identified include a 19 year old H/M city resident, a 17 year old H/M city resident, a 16 year old H/M city resident, and an 18 year old H/M city resident. The case has been closed by arrest.

- The sixth gang motivated incident of the year was a homicide that was discovered on 12/4/2015 at 1130 hours. The homicide occurred in Four Mile Park, located at 3800 Mt Vernon Ave. The victim was a 22 year old H/M city resident, who was killed by an MS-13 gang member. A 18 year old H/M non-city resident was charged with murder in relation to this incident, which has been closed by arrest.
- The seventh gang motivated incident of the year was a felonious assault that took place on 12/8/2015 at 1345 hours. The assault occurred along the 3800 block of Executive Ave. The victim was a 20 year old H/M city resident, who was threatened with a machete by MS-13 gang members. A 22 year old H/M city resident, a 19 year old H/M city resident, and a 18 year old H/M city resident were arrested in relation this case, which has been closed by arrest.

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An additional significant incident occurred in 2015 that was not gang motivated, but was found to be gang related. A homicide was discovered on 11/9/2015 at 1915 hours. The incident occurred in Beverly Park, located at 620 N Overlook Dr. The victim was a 24 year old H/M city resident, who was killed by MS-13 gang members. A 17 year old H/M non-city resident was charged with murder in relation to this incident, and two additional suspects are in police custody.

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




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


# Density of Graffiti Incidents






# Density of Graffiti Incidents





**City of Alexandria**  
**Gang Prevention and Intervention / Quality of Life Report**

January 15, 2016

**Overview:** Gang Prevention and Intervention has operated on local and regional task forces since 2006 and follows a best-practice Comprehensive Gang Model from the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention. The core strategies prescribed by this model to combat gangs are enhanced law enforcement, community involvement/mobilization, social outreach/prevention, opportunities provisions and organizational change/policies. An overarching theme of this model is targeting the most vulnerable neighborhoods and individuals most at risk of gang involvement.

**Current Subcommittees:**

**Incident Review Subcommittee:** This is a closed door meeting that meets quarterly. It is chaired by Task Force member, Mr. Steve Jansen, who is chief operating officer and vice president for the Association for Prosecuting Attorneys. This subcommittee is modeled after the Milwaukee Homicide Review Commission and is applied to review any gang motivated incident that has occurred in the community or within the schools. Incidents are analyzed to ascertain lessons for law enforcement, prosecution, intervention and prevention.

**Job Readiness and Opportunities Provisions Subcommittee:** Originally a sub-committee on 'dropout prevention' this has evolved into a partnership with ACPS, SAPCA, ACAP and Workforce Development to explore avenues for implementation of "21 Workforce Readiness Skills", which is already being taught by ACPS. In December 2015, collaboration with RPCA, APD-Cops, Untouchables, Workforce Development Center, ARHA and community members targeted a group of 18-26 year olds in the Andrew Adkins area. Employment support is active through Workforce Development. Future recreational and job/training opportunities are planned.

**Family Reunification Subcommittee:** Collaboration with numerous City agencies and local non-profits, educational entities (George Mason University), and faith based community. Analysis of information from Incident Review Subcommittee applied to Comprehensive Gang Model suggests targeting of recently arrived Central American teenagers is an urgent necessity. Current goals include development of professional trainings for school and City staff on family reunification and trauma, initial planning collaboration with ACPS for developing 'welcoming' workshops for ELL registration (both for Kindergarten and for newly arrived immigrants-focus will be on parent readiness and what to expect as parents of ACPS students and also exposure to community resources). Through collaboration with Community Lodgings an ongoing support group for newly arrived immigrant children and families is being planned to begin in late January/ early February. A reunification parenting program is also in the works at Francis C. Hammond being done through partnership with NVFS.

**Community Outreach and Education Subcommittee:** Gang Prevention and Intervention Coordinator offers professional staff trainings on gangs and commercial sexual exploitation. Close contacts in El Salvador through City's exchange remain important as information and current events in El Salvador remain closely tied to families and children in Alexandria. Ongoing parent groups take place several times per month through collaboration with FACE Center, Casa Chirilagua, Brent Place and Community Lodgings, just to name a few. Also, gang prevention and intervention talks happen monthly with ACPS students in the school setting, in different after school and community based programs.

**Other Initiatives:**

-**IPE Program** (Intervention Prevention and Education Program)- Continues to provide 1:1 and support to families for children referred for gang prevention and intervention services. So far this FY we have served 44 Alexandria youth (10-21).

-**Alexandria Mentoring Partnership**- AMP continues to operate and currently includes 13 of Alexandria's mentoring programs. MENTOR RECRUITING EVENT FOR NATIONAL MENTORING MONTH IS 1/20/16. See Flyer.

-**Mayors Campaign to End Bullying** – Ongoing collaboration by several City agencies.

-**Commercial Sexual Exploitation-Sex Trafficking:** Working with CAC, APD, ACPS, DCHS on assessing and exploring community response for identified victims of CSE. Related to this, we are also looking at an intervention model to address chronic runaway children in the City. In addition our Northern Virginia Regional Gang Task Force prevention and intervention coordinators are coordinating a victim intervention protocol that can be modeled in the various jurisdictions.





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During November and December, the Inmate Work Detail Program performed community service projects, which included trash collection in various areas of the City. The crews also provided assistance to other City agencies and responded to specific requests. Those projects are included in this report as well. Normally, there are two work detail crews with up to four or five participants per crew and that number can fluctuate throughout the months due to limited qualified participants. During this reporting period, there was an average of six inmates participating on the program.

- Public Safety Center: 10 visits, 78 bags of leaves
- Breckinridge Cemetery/ 1 visit, 8 bags

- Four Mile Run Park/ Arlandria: 3 visits, 17 bags
- Burke Library: 1 visit, 1 bag
- Braddock Road Metro: 1 visit, 1 bag
- King Street Metro: 1 visit, 1 bag

- Collected 26 barricades and unloaded them at Four Mile Run Park.
- Delivered 28 boxes of Classification and Sheriff's Records to Covanta Waste-to-Energy facility.
- Unloaded a large order of toiletries for Sheriff's Office Classification.
- Unloaded 623 Christmas Trees at Union Station to sale with proceeds to benefit the APD Youth Camp.

- Delivered and collected 86 barricades at G.W. Middle School for the Turkey Trot Run.
- Placed and removed holiday garland on light poles on King Street to Union Street.
- Staged snow supplies at the Public Safety Center.
- Delivered 12 boxes of records from Sheriff's Office Records Section to Archives to be burned.
- Distributed and later collected 37 barricades at the end of King Street for First Night event.
- Assisted at City Hall with packing 50 boxes of coats and blankets for refugee families.
- Moved lockers and desk from 801 Payne Street to the Adult Detention Center.
- Removed graffiti from bricks on second floor of Sheriff's Office.
- Assisted Ann Dorman with packing items from First Night event.

## **HOURS AND SAVINGS**

During November and December, the number of hours completed by the Inmate Work Detail (excluding Recreation) totaled 552. The total funds saved in City wages for this time period was \$15,124.80, based on the hourly rate of \$27.40.

The number of hours complete by the Inmate Work Detail for Recreation was 72 hours, representing a savings of \$1,972.80.







# Department Updates

## Resource Recovery

- The 2015 Leaf Collection season concluded Wednesday, December 30th. We are now collecting Christmas Trees in preparation for spring mulching.

## Public Works

- Installed Automatic Vehicle Location (AVL) system, which is a GPS vehicle tracking system for the snow program. This system is used to reduce response time, manage which streets have been plowed and at what speed work is being completed. An added feature is the AVL systems can detect when the brooms for plowing go up and down. This system is also accessible through an app on City cell phones.
- Snow preparation is complete and we are just waiting for winter weather.

## Traffic Operations

- Due to fewer daylight hours during the winter months, Traffic Operations is committing to increasing nighttime visibility and retro-reflectivity of all street signage in three corridors (Beauregard Street, Van Dorn Street, and Quaker Lane). This review will encompass all signage along the corridor, including street signs, regulatory signs such as speed limit signs and parking signs, and warning signs such as signal ahead or curve ahead. We anticipate replacing approximately 100 signs by the end of February to improve the nighttime visibility of the signage on these corridors.
