Conference Speakers

Drew Falconer, MD is Board Certified in Neurology and a fellowship-trained Movement Disorders Specialist with the Inova Movement Disorders Program. He specializes in advanced care of patients with Parkinson's disease, essential tremor, dystonia, Huntington's disease, tic disorders and other movement disorders. He is uniquely qualified in the areas of deep brain stimulation (DBS) and botulinum toxin injections. A 3-time winner of the String of Pearls Neurology Teaching Award at Georgetown University Hospital, Dr. Falconer also was awarded the Mother of Pearls Top Resident Teacher Award and the Hugh H. Hussey Excellence in Education Award, both from Georgetown University Hospital. He is member of the American Academy of Neurology and the International Parkinson and Movement Disorder Society.

Margot Greenlee, Director, BodyWise Dance, and her team conduct dance programs with the Washington D.C. Veterans Administration Medical Center, the National Center for Creative Aging, MVLE, and numerous assisted living residences across the greater D.C. region. Participatory dance-making, personal agency, creativity – these are the foundation of Margot Greenlee's choreographic vision. Featured in Dance Magazine's "Beyond Performance," her approach is based on 20 years of experience in community arts engagement, first as a solo artist and later as a dancer with the Liz Lerman Dance Exchange (1999-2007).
