



Oct. 8th

Reproductive Coercion: VA Action Alliance, Project PEACE+ Doorways

Join us as we discuss the connection between domestic violence and reproductive health. In this brief presentation, participants will learn about sexual and reproductive coercion, how to identify red flags for sexual and reproductive coercion, and best practices for screening and safety planning with survivors. We will close the presentation with a conversation and connection to reproductive justice, an intersectional framework coined by SisterSong that understands reproductive health in a full and holistic way.

LGBTQIA+ Community: Alexandria Safe Space NoVA + YALLS

Anyone can be harmed by intimate partner and sexual violence, regardless of race, class, sexual orientation and gender. And we know that Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer, Intersex and Asexual+ (LGBTQIA+) identified youth are disproportionately impacted by these traumas. This session will explore healthy relationships and consent through the lens of the LGBTQIA+ Youth Community. Spiritual Abuse: JCADA + LAWS

Through the lens of Judaism, we will learn about the many ways in which religion intersects with power-based violence. We will examine the ways in which spiritual abuse manifests in different types of Jewish communities and how to help create spiritually specific safety plans. We will examine the role religion plays in abusive relationships through activities and discuss how to support survivors who are suffering spiritual abuse.

Technology Abuse: Fairfax County Domestic + Sexual Violence Services

Technology is a vital part of how we live our lives. From our phones, to our computers, to our smart devices, we rely on it to help us. Technology also creates opportunity for misuse and harm by those using violence in their relationships. In this session, we will discuss the most common forms of technology that are misused in domestic violence and the risks that survivors face from tech based abuse. We will explore how to support survivors using tech safely and integrating conversations about tech into safety planning.
