Grant: STEM and Financial Literacy Programs

Purpose: To support organizations that provide innovative and experiential K-8 STEM learning opportunities that promote an early interest in STEM career fields and improve teachers' capabilities in STEM or that provide financial education curriculum to grade 9-12 students focused on navigating major financial milestones such as student debt, credit, home ownership, financial products and services/financial capability, and family needs

Eligibility: 501(c)(3) organizations

Grant: STEM + Computing Partnerships

Purpose: To advance the integration of computational thinking and computing activities in early childhood education through high school (preK-12) to provide a strong and developmental foundation in computing and computational thinking through the integration of computing in STEM teaching and learning, and/or the applied integration of STEM content in pre-K-12 computer science education

Funder: National Science Foundation

Eligibility: No restrictions

YOUTH WELL-BEING

Grant: Innovative Field Spaces

Purpose: To build or enhance a field space for soccer

Funder: U.S. Soccer Foundation

Eligibility: Applicants must operate in the United States; be an organization with IRS approved tax-exempt status at the time of application; offer soccer-specific programming directly or through partnerships; meet insurance and grant agreement requirements; and run programming consistent with the grant's theme (innovative and/or non-traditional soccer programs)

Deadline: February 3

Amount: Three year-grants ranging between \$10,000 and \$30,000 a year will be awarded for the purchase of soccer equipment and/or to cover operating expenses.

Grant: Track and Field Youth Clubs

Purpose: To support and expand high quality programs that attract diverse ethnic and socio-economic youth and that promote character building, education, active healthy and drug free behaviors, including event participation in track and field and cross country/road running. The Foundation favors the use of grant money to expand existing youth programs/clubs, to provide additional competitive opportunities for children, and to enhance the experience for all participants.

Funder: The USA Track & Field Foundation

Eligibility: Preference is given to youth track clubs and programs that are based in low-income areas. Also favored are programs that have a history of solid financial management, multiple funding sources and community support.

Deadline: Ongoing

Amount: Unspecified; allowable expenses include equipment, uniforms, meet fees, travel, facility rental, staff and volunteer training, and outreach

Grant: Consolidated Youth & Engaging Men Program

Purpose: To provide coordinated community responses that support child, youth and young adult victims through direct services, training, coordination and collaboration, effective intervention, treatment, response, and prevention strategies; and to provide the opportunity for communities to increase collaboration among non-profit victim service providers, community service organizations (including those focused on engaging men as role models), schools, tribes and tribal governments, and local government agencies to enhance prevention, intervention, and response efforts in addressing sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence and stalking in children, youth, and young adults ages 0-24

Funder: Office on Violence Against Women

Eligibility: Nonprofits having a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS (other than institutions of higher education), city or township governments, county governments, Native American tribal governments (federally recognized), Native American tribal organizations

Deadline: February 16

Amount: 10 – 25 awards of up to \$750,000 for Comprehensive Projects and up to \$350,00 for Engaging Men Projects

Grant: Enhancing Youth Access to Justice Initiative

Purpose: To provide funding to a national training and technical assistance provider to deliver intensive assistance to states to develop and implement effective, well-resourced, statewide juvenile defense strategic plans. The provider will also work to improve indigent defense (including post-disposition representation) and the overall level of systemic advocacy by providing the juvenile defense bar with cost-effective, innovative training programs, tools and practice guidelines, technical support, capacity-building assistance, and leadership opportunities, and by collaboratively engaging experts and stakeholders. Grants will also fund resource centers to help state, tribal and local juvenile defense systems enhance the quality of legal representation, leverage resources, and collect and analyze data to measure the effectiveness of services. In addition, awards will be made to community-based nonprofit organizations to provide direct civil legal

services, mentoring and reentry planning to justice-involved youth who are transitioning or have recently transitioned back to their families and communities following secure confinement or out-of-home placement.

Funder: Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention

Eligibility: Nonprofits having a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, private institutions of higher education, public and state controlled institutions of higher education, for profit organizations other than small businesses

Deadline: March 2

Amount: 8 awards of \$300,000 - \$1,500,000

Grant: Youth Microgrants

Purpose: To encourage youth to complete service projects in their communities. Examples of fundable projects include but are not limited to turning a vacant lot into a community garden, rebuilding a school playground, or helping senior citizens get their homes ready for winter.

Funder: Karma for Cara Foundation

Eligibility: Youth 18 and under

Deadline: April 1

Grant: Safe and Thriving Communities: Planning and Collaboration

Purpose: To strengthen community capacity to stem violence and reduce youth offending and victimization

Funder: Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention

Eligibility: States (including territories) as joint applicants with units of local government or with federally recognized tribal governments as determined by the Secretary of the Interior; units of local government; federally recognized tribal governments

Deadline: April 3

Amount: 10 awards of up to \$333,000; OJJDP expects to make awards for an 18-month period of performance to begin on October 1, 2017

COMMUNITY

Grant: Community Bike Program

Purpose: To support important projects that leverage federal funding and help build momentum for cycling in communities across the United States. Projects eligible for support include bike paths, rail trails, and mountain bike trails; BMX facilities; end-of-trip facilities such as bike racks, bike parking, bike repair stations, and bike storage; and some advocacy initiatives.

Funder: PeopleForBikes

Eligibility: Nonprofit organizations with a focus on bicycling, active transportation, or community development; city or county agencies/departments; state or federal agencies working locally

Deadline: Letters of Interest must be received no later than January 20. Upon review, selected applicants will be invited to submit a full application by April 7.

Amount: Up to \$10,000; a specific percentage match is not required, but leverage and funding partnerships are looked at carefully. Requests for funding that would amount to 50% or more of the project budget will not be considered.

Grant: Critical Care Support

Purpose: To assist post-9/11 combat-wounded and their families as they navigate the long-term recovery process

Funder: Hope for the Warriors

Eligibility: Applicants must be seeking support for needs that are a direct result of a service member's post-9/11 combat-related injury.

Deadline: Open

Amount: Program case coordinators work daily with post-9/11 combat-wounded service members and veterans, their families, and families of the fallen to meet immediate financial needs. The program assists service members, veterans, and their families by providing casework assistance and resource referrals that assist the client both today and in the future. If the client meets the criteria, financial support may be given to assist the family in the short term.

Grant: Promoting the Human Rights of Women and Girls, Persons with disabilities, and LGBTI Persons

Purpose: To advance the human rights of women and girls, persons with disabilities, and LGBTI persons; projects must have immediate impact with long-term implications on discrimination and/or violence across all three groups

Funder: Bureau of Democracy, Human Rights and Labor

Eligibility: U.S. and foreign-based nonprofit/nongovernment organizations; public international organizations; private, public or state institutes of higher education; for-profit organizations

Deadline: January 23

Amount: One award of \$200,000 - \$400,000

Grant: Patient-Centered Health Care Research

Purpose: To support projects that encourage the active integration of patients, caregivers, clinicians, and other healthcare stakeholders as integral members of the patient-centered outcomes research/clinical effectiveness research (PCOR/CER) enterprise

Funder: Patient-Centered Outcomes Research Institute

Eligibility: Applications may be submitted by any private or public-sector organization, including any nonprofit or for-profit organization, or any unit of local, state, or the federal government. All U.S. applicant nonprofit organizations must be recognized by the Internal Revenue Service. Non-domestic components of organizations based in the United States and foreign organizations also may apply if demonstrable benefit to the U.S. healthcare system and U.S. efforts in the area of patient-centered research can be clearly shown.

Deadline: Letters of Intent must be received no later than February 1. Upon review, selected applicants will be invited to submit a complete applications within forty days of receiving the invitation.

Amount: Up to \$250,000 over two years

Grant: Community-Based Participatory Research Program

Purpose: To support interdisciplinary research in the biological, medical, epidemiological, behavioral, and social sciences related to family planning in a wide range of research areas, including improvements in basic conceptual or biomedical knowledge; design of programs or policies that will provide family planning more safely, efficiently and extensively; studies of the social and psychological dimensions of family planning services and programs. Acceptable projects include but are not limited to studies that involve survey data, focus groups, or semi-structured interviews to identify community needs for intervention on a specific family planning issue or for process evaluation of a pilot intervention.

Funder: Society of Family Planning Research Fund

Eligibility: Nonprofit 501(c)(3) tax-exempt community-based organizations, including health, social service, and other CBOs; advocacy organizations; grassroots organizations. Proposals must be submitted by a team that includes co-principal investigators, one from a research or academic setting and one from a community organization, and the roles of each must be clearly described. The PI at the research organization must be an SFP full or junior fellow. All research and community partners must be identified on the proposal.

Deadline: Letters of Intent must be received no later than January 31. Upon review, selected applicants will be invited to submit a full proposal by March 8.

Amount: Three grants of up to \$150,000 each for a two-year period

Grant: Impact Software Grants

Purpose: To support a select group of nonprofits that can effectively leverage the foundation's learning and development technology in innovative and tangible ways for significant community impact. The foundation will be holding an informational webinar on January 24 at 10:00 a.m.

Funder: Cornerstone OnDemand

Eligibility: Applicants must be an IRS-registered 501(c)(3) organization; have an existing training initiative that requires a technology solution to effectively scale; have a clearly articulated vision or plan for expansion of the program; and be able to demonstrate executive support for the program and the ability to commit to it financially in years three to five.

Deadline: March 17

Amount: Grant recipients receive a two-year donation of Cornerstone OnDemand software and services, including unlimited use of its Learning Management System and access to a range of pro bono business consulting services. While an LMS is often used to support the learning and development of an organization's internal employees, the focus of the Impact Grant program is to enable nonprofits to leverage the technology to better reach, train, and prepare their external network — the individuals and communities they serve. During the two-year period, the foundation will closely monitor impact and progress made against the goals of the initiative. Projects that clearly demonstrate results, are scalable, and have executive-level support will be eligible to receive significant discounts on software at the conclusion of the grant period.

Grant: Substance Abuse Programs

Purpose: To support organizations and programs that advance the prevention, diagnosis, and treatment of alcoholism, chemical dependency, and addictive behavior, including support for related research and education

Funder: Hanley Family Foundation

Eligibility: Applicants must be considered tax-exempt under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code or qualify as a public charity as described in Section 509(a)(1), (2), or (3).

Deadline: The foundation accepts pre-proposals on an ongoing basis. Upon review, selected applicants will be invited to submit a full proposal. Grant applications received by March 31 will be decided on by May 31; those received by September 30 will be decided on by November 30.

Amount: Grant amounts are determined on a project-by-project basis.
