In an effort to continue outreach efforts into the fall months, on September 10 Chief Cook hosted the first *Police in the Park* event to meet with Tarleton Park and Cameron Station area residents and discuss the concerns they have about crime and quality of life

in their neighborhoods. Before this event Chief Cook made an unannounced visit to the businesses at Foxchase Shopping Center to check in with the employees and business owners in the area. Chief Cook later held another *Police in the Park* event at All Veterans Park. He visited the businesses in the Trade Center Shopping Center prior to the event.

Homicide on North Fayette Street

Alexandria experienced its first homicide of 2015 on Thursday, July 2, in the 700 block of N. Fayette Street.

At approximately 11:32 p.m. officers responded to the area for a shooting. Police located the victim, 22-year-old Shakkan Elliot-Tibbs, of Woodbridge, suffering from a gunshot wound. The victim was transported to an area hospital where he later died. The investigation is ongoing.

In response to community concern regarding the homicide and recent reports of shootings in the area, the Police Department hosted a community meeting on July 6 to talk with residents about these crimes. A follow up to this meeting was held a month later to make sure residents felt their concerns were being addressed.

Homicide on Belle Pre Way

On October 7, the City experienced its second homicide of 2015. At approximately 11:45 p.m., officers responded to the area for a shooting. The victim was located by police suffering from a gunshot wound. The victim, Leon Williams, 37, of Alexandria, was transported to an area hospital where, he later died. The investigation is ongoing.

The Police Department reached out to the communities and surrounding areas of this recent homicide to ensure all questions and concerns were heard or being addressed.

Many times, success in solving these cases comes as the result of a willingness of the community to share information with our officers and detectives. We are asking anyone with information about this incident to please contact Sergeant David Cutting at 703.746.6627.

Silent Witnesses Raise Awareness about Domestic Violence

During the entire month of October, Silent Witnesses took up residence in the lobby of Alexandria Police Department Headquarters. October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month. Its goal is to raise awareness and connect advocates across the nation who are working to end violence against women and their children.

Throughout the month, the City of Alexandria displays silhouettes of victims who died due to domestic violence at various locations. Family, friends, and community members honor these lives by displaying these silhouettes at various locations. The silhouettes memorialize Alexandrians who died at the hands of domestic violence. They will also represent the thousands of City residents who are still being hurt by those they love, and are still in danger.

The Silent Witness Project is a nation-wide initiative that began in Minnesota in 1990. The project was launched by a group of Minnesota women who felt an urgency to do something about the escalating domestic violence in their state. Twenty-six life-size red silhouettes were created, each bearing the name of a woman whose life was brutally cut short due to the violence in her life.



Three silhouettes of domestic violence victims from Alexandria were displayed in Police Department Headquarters throughout October to raise awareness about domestic violence.

APD HISTORY

October 1 marked the 50th anniversary of the Alexandria Police Department hiring its first African-American police officer.



Albert A. Beverly, a 24 year old African-American from King George County and an Air Force veteran, took the oath of office on

October 1, 1965, becoming the first person of color to be sworn in as an Alexandria police officer. At the time, Officer Beverly said he just wanted "to be equal and treated like all the other rookies on the Alexandria Police force." Officer Beverly served in Patrol, the Community Relations Unit, and the Youth Division before retiring in 1985.

CAPTAIN JUAN TORRES RETIRES

In July, Captain Juan Torres retired from the Police Department after 26 years of dedicated service. Following his retirement, Captain Torres moved from Alexandria to Oberlin, Ohio, where he was hired as the town's new police chief.



POLICE PARTICIPATE IN OPERATION CROSS COUNTRY

On October 6, members of the Police Department and Federal Bureau of Investigations (FBI) gathered at a local hotel to conduct sting operations as part of the FBI's nationwide Operation Cross Country enforcement. Operation Cross Country is a week-long, enforcement action to address commercial child sex trafficking throughout the United States. This year's enforcement action, coordinated through 73 of the FBI's Child Exploitation Task Forces (which include federal, state, and local law enforcement agencies) was conducted nationwide in 135 cities. More than 500 law enforcement officials took part in sting operations in hotels, casinos, truck stops, and other areas frequented by pimps, prostitutes, and their customers.

This year, the FBI's Public Information Office filmed operations in Alexandria, Virginia and Jackson, Mississippi as part of their awareness campaign. The video and interviews captured were used in their nationwide campaign. Major crime and arrests from July 1, 2015 through October 30, 2015



Fatal Pedestrian Crash at Intersection of Braddock Road and Commonwealth Avenue

Around 9:40 a.m., on Thursday, September 3, Alexandria Police were called to the intersection of Braddock Road and Commonwealth Avenue for reports of a pedestrian struck by a vehicle. Upon arrival, the victim was located and was later pronounced dead at the scene. It was determined that sometime around 9:20 a.m. an unknown vehicle struck and killed a female pedestrian victim.

The victim of was later identified as Deborah Ann Bogart, 60, of Alexandria. The vehicle and driver involved in this incident were identified on the day of the incident.

On October 21, Alexandria Commonwealth's Attorney Bryan Porter released his decision to not seek charges in the pedestrian fatality.

Police Investigate Shooting on Edison Street

The Alexandria Police Department is investigating a shooting that occurred in the 3700 block of Edison Street on Tuesday, October 20.

At approximately 8:56 p.m., officers responded to a report of shots heard in the area of Edison Street and Mark Drive. Upon arrival, officers located the victim, a 32 year-old male, suffering from an injury to an extremity. He was transported to a local hospital. The victim's injury was identified as a non-life-threatening gunshot wound. The investigation is ongoing.

Police Investigate Shooting on Duke Street

The Alexandria Police Department is investigating a shooting that occurred in the 4200 block of Duke Street on Tuesday, August 18.

At approximately 8:26 p.m., officers responded to a report of shots heard in the 4200 block of Duke Street. As officers investigated the initial report, they were notified that a 53 year-old man arrived at a local hospital with a gunshot wound. The victim had driven himself to the hospital. The investigation is ongoing.

ARRESTS

Police Arrest Two for Grocery Store Bomb Threats

Dewayne Ishmell, 37, of Washington, D.C., was charged with two counts of Threats to Bomb. Melvin Kelly, 36, of Arlington, was charged with Soliciting Another to Communicate Threats to Bomb. They were both arrested on September 11, 2015. The suspects were arrested in connection with five bomb threats at the Harris Teeter grocery store, located at 735 N. St. Asaph Street between April 30 and July 20.

Police Arrest Alexandria Man for Robbery

Police arrested Muhammed Jagne, 20, of Alexandria, on August 27, in connection with a series of robberies in the West End of Alexandria. He was charged with Robbery and Attempted Robbery. Detectives determined the suspect was responsible for the following offenses.


- August 15: Robbery on the bike trail near 4600 block of Duke Street
- August 20: Attempted Robbery in the 4600 block of Raleigh Avenue

Police Arrest Suspect for Burglary

Around 8:49 a.m. on Thursday, August 20, police responded to a residence for the report of a breaking and entering in the 1100 block of Colonial Avenue. Police found several other area residences had also been entered. Patrol Officers arrested Tonny Anthony Pitt, 29, of Washington, D.C., at the scene. He was charged with Burglary and Possession of Burglariou Tools. More charges may be pending as the investigation continues.

Police Arrest Two for Robbery at Verizon Wireless Store

William Nolan, 20, of Forest Heights, MD, was arrested on June 28. Ronnie Ingram, 21, of Forest Heights, MD, was arrested on July 2, 2015. Nolan and Ingram were both charged with Robbery, Conspiracy to Commit Robbery, Use of a Firearm in Commission of a Felony and Abduction in connection with a robbery at the Verizon Wireless store, located at 800 block of S. Washington Street on June 25.



APYC CHRISTMAS TREE SALE

Police Investigate Shooting on Ellsworth Street

On Saturday, August 28, at approximately 11:52 p.m., Alexandria Police responded to a report of a person injured in the 3100 block of Duke Street. Upon arrival, officers located the victim, a 34 year old male City resident, suffering from an injury to the abdomen. He was transported to a local hospital. The victim's injury was identified as a non-life threatening gunshot wound at the hospital. Officers determined the crime occurred in the 100 block of Ellsworth Street. The investigation is ongoing.

Police Investigate Robbery at sweetFrog

On Wednesday, August 29, Alexandria Police responded to a robbery of sweetFrog, a frozen yogurt shop located in the 500 block of S. Van Dorn Street.

Around 4:20 p.m., on Wednesday, July 29, an unknown man entered the store, sat at a table, and waited for customers to leave. The suspect then approached the cashier and brandished a knife. He took cash from the register and fled. There were no injuries.

The suspect is described as a white male in his mid to late 20's, average height, brown hair, a mustache with a goatee, and a slim build. He was last seen wearing a white t-shirt with a graphic on the back, dark shorts, flip flops, a baseball cap, and glasses.

The suspect fled the scene in a newer model silver Honda accord. The vehicle had front end damage, a missing front grille, and the passenger side mirror was hanging from the car. A white female with blond hair was driving the vehicle.

Police Investigate Shooting on First Street



Upon arrival, officers located the victim, a 31 year-old male non-City resident, suffering from injuries to the lower body. He was transported to a local hospital. The victim's injuries were identified as several non-life-threatening gunshot wounds at the hospital.
