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- 1. Be a meaningful place for community gathering and social interaction
- 2. Be multi-functional and adaptable
- 3. Be continuous and connected, and provide connectivity for recreational users and habitat
- 4. Enhance diversity, inclusivity, equity, and accessibility
- 5. Enrich understanding of our history and cultural traditions
- 6. Promote health and well being
- 7. Foster environmental sustainability
- 8. Preserve, protect, and/or enhance existing natural areas
- 9. Preserve and protect outdoor historical and cultural resources
- 10. Promote habitat benefits for wildlife





New criteria: Ability to support the goals of publicly accessible open space

- 1. Privately owned land near or adjacent to existing parks and trails
- 2. Near or adjacent to existing schools
- 3. Near or adjacent to natural resource areas and wildlife corridors and refuges.
- 4. At street endings to provide neighborhood linkages
- 5. Next to institutional properties with extensive open space, valuable natural resources, and/or potential public access
- 6. Adjacent to or linking existing or proposed trails or greenways
- 7. Small lots in dense urban neighborhoods for pocket parks, gardens, green spaces, and playgrounds
- 8. Lands with significant trees, sloping-terrain, and other natural resource features
- 9. Properties with known or potential historic or cultural significance
- 10. Lands in areas identified in the Needs Assessment as those with a high need for open space
- 11. Excess rights-of-way
- 12. Open space and trail connections adjacent to or linking open spaces, natural areas, greenways and trails in Arlington, or Fairfax Counties



Proposed changes

- Add a question about the property supporting the goals of publicly accessible open space
- Add a category that evaluates the liabilities and constraints of the site to determine what remediation and maintenance may be required
- Add a question/criteria that identifies the redevelopment potential of the site to accommodate passive and active uses
- Add question/criteria evaluating open space, socio-economic, and recreational gaps the site would be helping to fulfill.



Metrics and Goals



- Evaluate and recommend methods of pursuing new publicly accessible open space.
 - 1. Develop criteria for considering opportunities for open space acquisition through the Open Space Fund (such as connectivity, walkability to neighborhood needs, access to water, etc.).
 - 2. Develop minimum publicly accessible open space criteria for small area plans based on current and future demographic needs and neighborhood characteristics.
 - 3. Evaluate the Open Space Ratio and/or other targets based on national standards and benchmarks for localities with similar densities.







- 7.3 acres per 1,000 residents
 - o Is this goal achievable in the long run?
 - Population growth is trending upwards within our fixed geographic boundary
 - Costs of open space acquisitions and maintenance
 - Open space shared with other agencies may involve creative approaches to meet the demands of these other agencies



Task 2: Evaluate the Open Space Ratio

- Current goal: 7.3 acres of open space per 1000 residents (NRPA metric)
 - Good baseline metric to have
 - Does not measure density, quality, population growth, or look at specific sections of the City



Task 2: Evaluate the Open Space Ratio

Updated goal:

- Look at open space at smaller geographic levels throughout the City
- Focus on quality over quantity
- Look at ways to incorporate equity in open space distribution throughout the City





- Accessibility Walkability maps
 - 97% of Alexandrians live within a 10minute walk to open space
- Sustainability EAP and Urban Forestry Master Plan
- Equity
 - Density, quality of open space, Alexandria resident makeup of open space types

Where do we need to keep working



- Equity measures
 - Proposed equity measures/recommendations:
 - Density maps (helps us identify where we may need to focus more open space – recommendation within SAP)
 - ACPS data on socioeconomic demographic data from the City – help us identify areas that need more attention
 - Condition assessment of open space (to ensure the open space we are providing as a city meets certain parameters)
 - Include assessment of what we have



Task 1 Goals

The City of Alexandria seeks to preserve, increase, and enhance publicly accessible open space to provide citizens and visitors with assured access to open spaces which support a healthy, livable and sustainable city; to enrich and enhance our cultural and historic heritage; to promote opportunities for community gathering and common use and preservation of natural resources in our diverse city.
